We are coming to the close of our landfill season with only 2 more landfill days left – September 14th & October 5th. If you need to do a final yard clean up for the year, be sure to purchase a \$5.00 landfill sticker either at the Town Office, or from a landfill attendant at the landfill. An <u>IMPORTANT REMINDER</u> – for your safety and the safety of the landfill attendants, Trailers will <u>NOT</u> be allowed to drive up on top of the landfill pile for the remainder of the season. This safety concern regarding Trailers will be <u>STRICTLY ENFORCED</u>. Please find alternative means of disposal...such as a pick-up truck or SUV. We appreciate your cooperation regarding this safety concern.

OLD HOME DAY WEEKEND "Celebrate Your Red, White & Blue" **SEPTEMBER 14, 2024** History of "Old Home Days"

Late Summer in New England is the best of both worlds. Warm days still allow for outdoor fun like swimming, but as the evening chill gradually creeps back in, cozy gatherings around a fire sound great, too. It's the perfect time for a community get-together. Newly elected New Hampshire Govenor Frank Rollins certainly thought so back in 1899, when he debuted Old Home Day. At the time, rural New England was grappling with the loss of residents who were lured away either by the adventure of the West or by the steady paycheck of an industrial job in the city. Two years earlier, in New England Magazine, Rollins had written: "I wish that in the ear of every son and daughter of New Hampshire, in the summer days, might be heard whispered the persuasive words: Come back, come back! What has become of the old home where you were born? Do you not remember it - the old farm back among the hills, the row of the stiff poplar trees, the lilacs and the willows?" Rollins ultimately took it upon himself to issue that call, in the form of Old Home Day - a celebration designed to draw former residents back in hopes that New Hampshire's rural charms would convince them to stay. Today, communities throughout New England and beyond still have Old Home Day circled on their calendars each year. Barbecues, potluck dinners, pie eating contests, and parades are among the typical highlights of Old Home Day. Meals often feature crops, like corn and apples, that are freshly harvested at the time of celebration; there might be a road race to help burn off some of those calories, too. If the town has a bandstand, there will be live music - a performance that might just culminate in fireworks. No matter what form it takes, however, Old Home Day still works as an allure to draw wayward New Englanders home. It is indeed a reminder of who we were and how we lived, but it's more that just that: It is a celebration of the principles that we hope will guide us still, a light that helps show our best path forward.

- TOWN PICNIC @ SCOTT SMART FARM 12:00 NOON- grill will be available to cook your hamburgers, hot dogs, etc. The Town will furnish the Bean Hole Beans. Yummy!!!!
- **PICNIC EVENTS** may include:

 - Auction go to the 8th Grade Class of 2025.
 - 0 Kid's Bounce House, Kids Games
 - Horseshoe Tournament (time to be determined)

Code Enforcement

Dangers of Carbon Monoxide:

It may seem early to be talking about home heating equipment but Fall is not far away and the summer months are a great time to have your heating appliances serviced. However, with generators and gas appliances, carbon monoxide is a concern year-round.

Carbon monoxide (CO), often called "the silent killer," is a gas you cannot see, taste, or smell. It can be created when fossil fuels, such as kerosene, gasoline, coal, natural gas, propane, methane, or wood do not burn properly. CO gas can be deadly. Carbon monoxide poisoning can result from faulty furnaces or other heating appliances, portable generators, water heaters, clothes dryers, or cars left running in garages.

Test CO alarms at least once a month and replace them if they fail to respond correctly. The sensors in CO alarms have a limited life. Replace the CO alarm according to manufacturer's instructions or when the end-of-life signal sounds. The date of manufacture and signals are usually listed on the back of the detectors.

School is almost back in session:

School will be starting the 29th of August. School buses will be running again and little ones waiting on the side of the road. Slow down and please pay extra attention as we drive through town. Please remember....it is <u>ILLEGAL</u> to pass a bus with its red lights on.

NEWS FROM THE CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT

The Code Enforcement Officer has been very busy this year with issuing building/electrical/septic permits, and addressing code enforcement violations throughout the town. There have been several ongoing code violation cases that have made their way to court for resolution. Many more code violation cases are being reviewed at the time of this mailing. If you know your yard needs to be cleaned up, be proactive in going to the Town Office and purchasing a landfill permit. This is an inexpensive cost and contributes in showing others that you care about your property and the community you live in. We all take pride in the Town of Greenbush and Thank You for your efforts.

There have also been multiple code violations regarding campers. The town has a Camper Policy which states: A "camper trailer" means a conversion bus, trailer, semi-trailer, manufactured or homemade tent trailer, which consists of a platform shell or box, with means of permanently or temporarily attaching a tent, and primarily designed and constructed to provide temporary living quarters for recreational camping and travel. A camper or travel trailer shall in <u>NO CASE</u> be used as a mobile home or as a permanent dwelling. Temporary use means no more than one hundred and eight days (180 days).

Contact the Code Enforcement Officer, and fill out the appropriate permits, <u>BEFORE</u> you intend to do any building/renovations, electrical or plumbing, add a shed, ect on your property. By having these conversations with the Code Enforcement Officer, this will give you a clear direction for your projects, and potentially avoid costly fines & court fees. The Code Enforcement Officer is in on Mondays 8:00am – 4:00pm.

BUREAU OF MOTOR VEHICLES

VEHICLE REGISTRATION UPDATES:

If you are registering a new vehicle or a complicated registration, please come in **ONE HOUR PRIOR TO CLOSING.** Any new residents must bring their prior registration upon renewal.

Tips to registering and re-registering smoothly:


1. **New registrations**: Bring white (previously blue) title application, bill of sale with proof that sales tax was paid, mileage, and insurance card with effective date of the day you are registering or before.

2. Bill of sale needs to include the following: Date of transaction, VIN number, year, make, model, mileage, seller information, with seller address, printed name legible, signature, buyer's name, signature, the amount that you are paying.

3. **Transferring a registration**: Bring prior registration you are transferring, white (formerly blue) title application, bill of sale, mileage, and proof of insurance.

4. Re-registration: Mileage, insurance card with effective date of the day you are registering or prior day.

NEWS FROM THE TAX ASSESSOR

Maine's constitution requires assessors to value property according to just value (the most probable price you would receive if you sold your home on the open market). In general, assessments should fall within the range of sales that have occurred involving similar properties.

CONTRACTO:

Although interest rates are higher, sales prices also continue to climb. For example, a ranch home on Cardville Road sold for \$255,000 in January of 2022 and sold again in September of 2023 for \$294,000. Another home on Spring Bridge Road recently sold for almost twice what it did in 2022.

Therefore, it will be necessary to adjust assessed valuations this year given that the sales continue to exceed the town's assessed valuations.

Effective for the tax bill that will be mailed in the fall of 2024, a 15% increase will be applied to all building values townwide.
